Singhampton Status

The contents that were deemed salvageable from the Singhampton building have been cleaned.

Windmar Property Restoration specialists were retained to clean the items, package, and transport them. The professional cleaning ensures that any mold spores present are killed, and do not remain in a dormant state.

The items that were recovered and cleaned include: most of the church pews, the Baptismal font, a cedarlined linen cabinet, lectern, two matching presider's chairs, the altar, two processional crosses, all the plaques and memorial items, vestments, linens, and

coverings.

In addition, three stained glass windows from behind the altar and one historic stained glass window were professionally removed and cleaned.

These cleaned items are being stored in the Batteaux building. They are being considered to be used where needed at Holy Trinity, or sold to parishioners and the general public, or donated The cost to clean the items was \$17000. The cost for the windows were an additional \$3000.

The Singhampton property remains contaminated with black mold, which includes the upper floor. The building cannot be entered as the mold poses a health and safety

risk. All items that could not be salvaged in the building have been disposed, as they are not safe for use.

The Diocesan Council has approved the sale of the Singhampton property, with 50% of the net proceeds to be allocated to the Ministry Allocation Fund, and 50% of the net proceeds allocated to Holy Trinity Clearview.

The Singhampton property, and has always been, owned by the Diocese of Toronto. The sale of the property will be handled by David Badian, Directory of the Property Resources department at the Diocese. The property will be sold with an "as is where is" condition.
